#### **Upcoming Events**

Katherine Christensen reminded everyone to start practicing because December 16th will be Cherrydale's Annual Holiday Caroling Event, Groups will meet on either side of Cherrydale and carol their way to a central location where they will meet for drinks and snacks. More information will be sent out via list-serve and the newsletter.

#### Sweet and Sour News

The Sweet and Sour News continues to be the best way to reach Cherrydale residents with neighborhood information. There are 1200 households in Cherrydale and only about 400 of those are signed up to the list serve. The newsletter is also the community's main source of revenue. Bill L'Hommedieu is the current Editor. If anyone has anything that they would like to be included in the newsletter, please let him know. There will be another newsletter in December to complete the 2007 advertising year and then again in January before the Association meeting. Evan made note that he has seen other communities' newsletters and the Sweet and Sour News is really leaps and bounds better than any of the ones he has seen. Brian did note that distribution to all of the households continues to be an issue and encouraged residents to contact the distribution captains.

#### Oak Grove Park/Yellow House Update

Knell Bumbalo gave an update on the Full Circle Montessori School and the properties located along Oak Grove Park. Knell's children attend Full Circle and she knows the Director. The County told the director that they are planning to move the yellow house to the edge of the property further down 17th street and sell it to a private citizen. The brick house on Quincy (whose driveway is often confused as an entrance to the park) has taken their house off of the market. Without the acquisition of both properties the school cannot move to that location. Maureen noted that the community should think about what they really want to happen with that land because it could end up being a large soccer field with lights – perhaps not a favorable result for the park's neighbors. Maureen also pointed out that Cherrydale's NC plan calls for the house to stay in the spot that it is in. Someone questioned why the County would want to move the house down on the property and Brian explained that moving the house allows the County to just sell the end of the land with the house and continue to use the rest of the property in contiguous fashion with the park. Moving the house farther away from Quincy also makes it a more marketable property.

#### **Featured Presentation: Historic Preservation** Tax Program

Terry Gaw explained that the Association is trving to encourage participation in the bi-monthly meetings and to that end will be providing speakers on various topics of interest as well as organizing fun activities like a chili cook off for the meetinas. Terry introduced this month's speaker: Michael Levinthal, Coordinator for the Historic Preservation Program within the Department of Community Planning, Housing and Development (DCPHD).

Cherrydale is designated as a Historic Community, which automatically qualifies Cherrydale homes built before 1955 as Historic Properties. A

survey of qualifying homes in Cherrydale was done MINUTES OF THE CHERRYDALE in 2003 (at the time of the community historical designation) and all of the homes that met the requirements are listed in the National Register of Historic Properties. There are more than 800 homes in Cherrydale that qualify. These homes may apply to participate in the state tax benefits program for home restoration. Originally set up o help owners improve homes that were not up to code, approval for the historic preservation tax program is based on three things:

1) Whether your home is listed in the National Register of Historic Properties.

2) How much you reinvest in your property. The value of the improvement must be 25 percent of the total value of the structure (not including the value of the land). Minimum is based on what your building is worth the year before

3) Completing the Certificate of Appropriateness forms. Mr. Levinthal emphasized that if you contact him, he will complete these forms for you.

The law in the state is that if you spend x amount and you qualify for the program, then 25 percent of what you spent can qualify as a tax credit (to be used over ten years). He pointed out that the State loses no money because you have paid sales tax and income tax. The most important part is that homeowners need to plan ahead. Retroactively applying for the program is tough to do – you need to have the appropriate before and after photos and homeowners must take advantage of the program within a year of completing the project.

Mr. Levinthal emphasized that the 25 percent credit only applies to money spent in the historical part of the building; money spent on additions or renovations to additions does not count. herefore, homeowners should try to do as much as possible in the old building (e.g., location of new furnace, new electrical box). Things that often are included as qualifying expenses for the program include: foundation work, water treatment, floors, walls, ceiling, exterior, interior, electrical, plumbing, HVAC, custom cabinets for the kitchen, fixtures, lighting fixtures, windows - retain historic windows and put in high end storm windows, and super insulation in your roof. He

noted that if there is a project you want to do and the state does not like it, don't do it right now - wait two years until after you are approved and then do it.

A Cherrydale resident recalled her experience with the Historical Preservation Program. Her home was built in 1913, and when they bought it nothing had really been done to it. They began the program because they wanted to get squirrels out of the attic. She noted that there were some aspects of her home that they couldn't prove what the house originally looked like. Michael really helped in proving that we once had a porch. They found there was some flexibility with how the state evaluated projects, there were certain restrictions (around windows), but they went back to the original siding and were able to completely redo theoutside of the house. She felt that the biggest downside of the program is you get greedy considering that you are getting 25 percent off. She noted that they were able fully insulate the house and to do many things that we might not have considered. Overall it was a really positive experience, Michael really helped us maximize everything we could do. The state did give feedback on the plans.

Mr. Levinthal completed his presentation by encouraging residents interested in participating in the program to go to the website of the Virginia Department of Historic Resources and research the rules and regulations. They can also contact Mr. Levinthal (703 228.3813) and he will walk you through the process. The state does charge you for two evaluations. Finally, Mr. Levinthal cautioned that the state can be pretty strict on some of their regulations. If it is a choice between your design and appearing the county to get the credits, do your design.

Brian thanked Michael for coming and announced that at the January meeting we are going to do a Chili Cook-off.

Meeting Adjourned at 9:00 pm.

## MINUTES OF THE CHERRYDALE CITIZENS ASSOCIATION

September 19, 2007 Presided by Brian Bonnet, President Minutes taken by Cindy Scarcella

Meeting called to order at 7:40 by Brian Bonnet. A quorum was present.

#### Fire Station/Bromptons

Brian opened the meeting by inviting Kimberly Pruitt and George May from the County to provide an update on the fire station. Kim Pruitt noted that tomorrow (Thursday, November 15th) is her last day with the county and she wanted to come in and say goodbye and thank Cherrydale citizens for all their hard work with the fire station. George May, her boss, will take over all of the issues related to the fire station

The current status for the project is that the Development Sales Agreement went to Koons on Halloween. This marks the beginning of the negotiation period. The county is waiting to hear back from Koons with their counter-agreement. Kim noted that she is not sure how long that will take, but does not anticipate it being a long process. The County was aware of what Koons wanted and the Agreement reflects that. Demolition of the Stowe and Hanson properties should be happening by the end of this year/beginning of next year.

Margaret McKelvey asked Kim if it is wise to tear the properties down before the sale deal with Koons is complete. She pointed out that if the sales agreement fell through, than the expense of tearing down the properties could be wasted money. Kim responded that the properties are considered a public nuisance - the Stowe property has been abandoned a very long time and is not structurally sound, contains lead paint, and just had asbestos removed, and the Hanson house has had all of its interior finishes removed, is nothing but sub-flooring, and the Terra Cotta foundation is starting to deteriorate. The County would have to demo the properties regardless of the Koons outcome.

Another Cherrydale Citizen asked if Kim had heard any information on the Bromptons. Kim responded that she had heard rumor that demo should happen soon. The company does need a demo permit (which has not been obtained).

Arlene Greenfield noted that she saw a flier on a telephone about a protest from the developer (Ed Peete) regarding county citations for the utility work. Brian responded that the County is citing them for not finishing the underground utility work because, at this point, it is all they can cite them for. Part of the reason it was not completed is that the Bromptons, Brown's, and the nursing home are all on the same transformer, so the utility work required is a lot more compli-

Maureen Ross asked Kim why the reason the Bromptons building was condemned is such a secret; she noted that if a private home were to

**Neighborhood Conservation** 

Brian introduced Harry Spector, Cherrydale's Neighborhood Conservation representative to give an update on the County NC meeting. Harry began with the good news: 18th street is finally the number one project for the funding round next month. The original project plan needed to be changed slightly because all NC projects are now required to be ADA compliant. For streets, this mean a minimum 4 foot wide sidewalk with a 5 foot turn around every 500 feet. Fortunately the grade on 18th street allows driveway aprons to be used as the turn around so the sidewalk can maintain a 4 foot width throughout. The final plan will have sidewalk on one side, planting strip on the other side, curb and gutter on both sides, and Carlyle street lamps. The planting strips will be 2 feet wide, so they will be mostly grass (they need to be 4 feet wide for trees). There will be some street narrowing at the N. Quincy St. end which will also eliminate one, maybe two, parking spots. The other "major" change is the addition of a retaining wall at the corner of 18th and N. Oakland.

Harry also discussed his impression from the October County NC meeting. At the meeting Mark Schwartz from Management and Finance discussed the 2008 Bond outlook. Harry felt like Mr. Schwartz was putting out feelers to see what the reaction would be if NC did not get fully funded (one project per neighborhood per bond cycle) again. Harry noted that all the neighborhoods just completed the NC Infrastructure Surveys (as requested by the County Manager) and after doing that, people are not in the mood to have the county come back and cut NC funding/





Designate emergency contacts in your bank of stored cell-phone numbers

e all carry our mobile phones with names and numbers stored in its memory. Unfortunately, nobody, other than us, knows which of these numbers belong to our closest family members

If we were to be involved in an accident or were taken ill, the people attending us by Scott E. Pardi would have our mobile phone but wouldn't Chief, Cherrydale Volunteer Fire Department

know who to call. There are hundreds of numbers stored, but which one is the contact person in case of an emergency? Hence the "ICE" (In Case of Emergency) Campaign.

The concept of ICE is catching on guickly. It is a method of contact during emergency situations. As cell phones are carried by the majority of the population, all you need to do is store the number of a contact person or persons who should be contacted in an emergency under the name "ICE" (In Case of Emergency). The idea was thought up by a paramedic who found that when he went to the scenes of accidents, there were always mobile phones with patients, but they didn't know which number to call. He thought that it would be a good idea if there was a nationally recognized name for this purpose.

In an emergency situation, emergency service personnel and hospital staff would be able to quickly contact the right person by simply dialing the number you have stored

For more than one contact name, simply enter ICE1, ICE2 and ICE3 etc. It's a great idea that can save your life! €

## Cherrydale Volunteer Firemen Carry on a Long Tradition of Christmas in Cherrydale

hristmas in Cherrydale! Lights, caroling, and, hopefully, sledding on Terrell's Hill (and for the very adventurous, the Cherrydale hill — down Lee Highway), are all a part of the holidays here. Several of our favorite traditions have been occurring not just for years, but for generations, Did you know Santa Claus has been visiting the community since the 1920s, courtesy of the Cherrydale Volunteer Fire Department?

The Christmas party of 1956 was typical of these popular, fun filled events. The entire event (as they always were, and still are) was organized by the Cherrydale Volunteer Fire Department, which asked the community for donations of used toys, especially bicycles. The fire fighters donated their time (and the materials) to fix up the old toys that were donated. These refurbished toys were then wrapped and given to "poor children" in the community. That year 58 kids received these refurbished toys, and 13 food baskets were given to "needy" families in Cherrydale. In addition, at the community party, held in the Fire Hall on Christmas Eve day, all the children in Cherrydale were able to visit with Santa Claus, and each received a red mesh stocking filled with an apple (donated by State Senator Harry Byrd), an orange (donated by Safeway), peanuts and a candy cane. Each child also received a small gift. Presents (donated by the Volunteers and the Cherrydale Elementary School PTA) had been wrapped (and marked "B" for boy, or "G" for girl) and placed under a glittering tree in the center of the room. After talking with Santa, each child was allowed to select his/

her own gift! About 250 children attended that year, and few (if any) forgot the mes-

donated by Senator Byrd, 300 oranges donated by Safeway, 112 pounds of candy, and 70 pounds of peanuts, were given away. Only 11 baskets of food were sent to "needy families", or the sick, injured or elderly members of the Cherrydale Volunteer Fire Department.

By 1961, the Cherrydale Volunteer Fire Department had stopped collecting and refurbishing old toys. Not only did the men stop volunteering to do the work necessary to fix up the toys, it was noted, with a great deal of sadness, that "today's children desire larger, more costly toys". Santa continued to visit every year, thrilling the little ones with gifts. Food baskets were still fixed up, but the number had dropped to six – and three of these were for the widows of fallen fire fighters.

The tradition continues today, with the CVFD donating over 300 substantial gifts, as well as well filled stockings, to our com-



### Black Bean Soup

(S.T. Manning, from "Cucumber Sandwiches and Other Fine Foods")

- 1 (24 ounce) can black beans
- 1 (15 ounce) can black beans
- 8 ounces hot salsa

Layer with dirt, green material (grass clippings) and baker's yeast disolved in a gallon of warm water sprinkled on each layer. Turn monthly and reap the benefits next April. \*\*
