3565 LEE HIGHWAY SITE PLAN REVIEW (UGLY BLDG PART 4)

Arlington County's Site Plan Review Committee has now held two meetings to discuss the site plan amendment that Christopher Company has requested for 3565 Lee Hwy (the old bank/TV station building at NE corner of Lee and Monroe). Maywood residents attended along with Cherrydalers Maureen Ross, Randy Morrow, Mike Foreman and Tom Korns. The County Board is tentatively set to vote on the Site Plan amendments on May 22.

In January the CCA voted down an increase in density. Christopher Co. is now requesting to add just 17 more units (from 49 to 66) with plans to make each unit slightly smaller, keeping the building the same size.

Concerns expressed by Residents of Cherrydale include:

- Rental vs Owner-Occupied Residents favor that the site plan require the units to be owner-occupied, which might be more likely with Condo-Association rules which require owner occupancy for 3 of every 5 years to continue ownership.
- We objected to proposed change in trim materials, from precast to brick on cornices and accent bands; the builder has agreed to original plans using precast trim.
- We did not object to proposed changes for bay windows from painted aluminum panels to compressed PVC or hardiplank as long as the dimensionality of the original drawings remains.
- Decreased Parking Ratio 1.8 to 1.4 spaces per unit (remains above average.)
- County has required the revision of sidewalk from pavers to concrete. We are concerned with the appearance. We understand the pavers along Lee Hwy have not functioned well becoming uneven. Will the transition be pleasing?
- The developer no longer plans to remove the stairs at the entrance, but they are slightly shifted toward Lee Hwy with a fence, looking less inviting
- Arts Donation the original site plan requires the builder to donate \$75,000 to an art project. We wish to ensure that the money is spent to improve the area along Lee Hwy rather than fund the general revenue of the county.

Snow Removal

A snow removal ordinance was asked to be created by the County by Cherrydale and other groups. Visit

Firestation Construction Update

CCA President Maureen Ross and near-neighbors Lita Miller and Harry Spector met last month with Arlington County and Whiting-Turner (W-T) representatives regarding the final construction phase of the Fire Station 3 Project. W-T is the general contractor for Phase 3, which includes building the fire station facility, putting the final blacktop on 21st Rd, east of the fire station, landscaping the 21st Rd pocket park, installing trees in the 21st Rd utility strip and completing the north side of the Lee Highway sidewalk from the Koons Toyota garage to Five Points.

W-T officials said they are ready to start construction immediately once the Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT) issues a permit. W-T told us that the construction trailer would be placed on-site and moved four times as construction progresses. The current timeline calls for the building exterior to be completed in late Fall and the interior to be finished by mid-Spring 2011 along with all other projects tied to the Fire Station 3 site plan. This timeline assumes VDOT issues a permit in May.

Construction hours will be 7 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. only, Monday-Saturday. W-T crews will park at St. Agnes Church on N. Randolph St., however, some management and sub-contractors will park at the 21st Rd pocket park site.

The completed fire station will have three engine bays, one EMS bay, a "Safe Haven" vestibule, and living quarters for 12 fire fighters. The parking lot retaining wall on top will feature an 8ft tall embedded Cherrydale cherry tree logo. An illustration of Fire Station 3 is posted on the "Fire (Station) in the Hole" web site, www.firestationinthehole.com, along with other project-related pictures.

STOP UTILITY COMPANIES FROM BLOCKING SIDEWALKS (PART TWO)

We need 100 citizens to send letters requesting that Virginia give the county the right to determine where utilities will placed on public paths.

Dear Governor McDonnell,

Arlington County is the most densely populated and highly urbanized county in the Commonwealth of Virginia. Utility companies doing business in Arlington County, including electric, internet, and cable television providers, currently are virtually unregulated in their placement of poles, wires, utility boxes, and other equipment associated with their service delivery to commercial and residential customers.

Currently, utility companies doing business in Arlington County frequently are locating and installing the aforementioned equipment so as to pose an obstacle to or otherwise impede the safe passage of pedestrians and others, including children, the elderly, and handicapped, on Arlington County sidewalks and other public rights of way. Unfortunately, the laws of the Commonwealth of Virginia, as presently constituted, afford Arlington County no authority to regulate the placement of equipment by utility companies doing business in Arlington County so as to provide for the safety and welfare of County residents and others traversing the sidewalks and public rights of way of Arlington County.

In order to remedy the situation described above, we, the undersigned residents of the Cherrydale community of Arlington County, hereby petition you to request that the Virginia House of Delegates and the Virginia State Senate pass legislation amending the State Code provisions for County Manager Plan of Government in Title 15.2 - 700, to provide authority for the County to regulate the installation, relocation, and replacement by private utility companies of poles, cable drops on poles, guy wires, conduits, underground utilities, utility boxes, fiber optics, overhead wires, and other appurtenances installed in public streets, public rights-of-way, and public easements that conflict or impede with the County's ability to implement public projects, comply with ADA requirements, comply with State, Federal and other environmental regulations, and maintain the safety and welfare of the public.

KOONS UPDATE

Roger Merletti, Randy Morrow and Maureen Ross have been in frequent contact with Koons Toyota regarding neighborhood concerns. The tire shop's use permit was in jeopardy for noncompliance with the agreement to plant trees. Persistence prevailed and as of mid April trees are in place and look beautiful. And following years of complaints, the delivery trucks for Koons have ceased delivering at 4 AM.

But more needs to be done. Bay doors at the tire shop continue to remain open during use of loud machinery. Reportedly snow plowed from the Koons property was dumped on the sidewalks, blocking the townhomes storm water drains and leaving approximately 300 pounds of winter street debris and bits of concrete on the sidewalk following the melting of the snow. A meeting with Koons will take place soon to rewiew and improve performance. The planting of trees was a good step, the product of diligent pursuit by the CCA.

The View from My Porch

This week our porch is decked out with cheerful balloons as we await delivery of my wife's baby, *The Bishop and the Seeker*.

For years, Teri and I visited a tiny Bahamian island where we were lifted and charmed by the passionate music-you-could-hear-down-the-block from the local churches. Finally, I decided to seek a similar experience back here. I found it 7 years ago at a then-all-Black church in the Highview Park neighborhood up Lee Highway behind Heidelberg Bakery.

We became regulars, the only White folk. Indeed, the music made the paint want to jump off the walls, and we were lovingly welcomed by all. Weeks turned into months; I even played Joseph in the Christmas pageant.

But, despite the hugging, high-5-ing, and warm friendships that evolved, we assumed our stay among those with such a radically different view of God would be short. We were, at heart, more inclined to the New Age, more metaphysical and interfaith spiritual path. Sure enough, at one point, Teri told the pastor, Bishop Phil Thomas, that the plan of salvation he preached sounded more like the Aplan of an insecure person without much imagination.

Instead of taking offense, the Bishop engaged Teri in a 2-year dialogue in which they tackled the most divisive issues of religion, politics, psychology, and sex. The result was her magnum opus, *The Bishop and the Seeker; Wrestling for the Soul of*

the 21st Century. Teri and Bishop Thomas decided to write their story so that the truce and then friendship that evolved can help those who yearn to transcend cultural conflict and work together for a better world. Brian McLaren, author of seven books including A Generous Orthodoxy, calls The Bishop and the Seeker Aa hopeful sign on many levels, with honesty and fresh insights from both sides, and a beautiful, well-told, and fun story, too. It will inspire you no matter which 'side' you're on.

Here's a quote from Teri's Preface: AAs we find ourselves living, working, and playing with people whose religions can seem so "other," interfaith friendships bring richness to life and peace to communities. I believe there are things we can all learn from each other as we mature in our understanding of this magnificent and mysterious life we find ourselves in.

CHERRYDALE LIBRARY'S CHINESE CHESTNUT NOTED

Cherrydale Library reports that the large Chinese chestnut tree gracing its front lawn has been approved by Arlington's Beautification Committee as a Notable Tree because of its size and age and will now be included on the County's online list of Notable Trees. Acting library manager **Rob Spencer** received the award—including a sign and certificate—from County Board Chairman Jay Fisette.

According to Cherrydale historian **Kathy Holt**, the tree is a seedling from a large tree that once stood in a field on the Shreve property on the north side of Lee Highway, approximately where Pasha Café's parking area is today. That original tree was beloved by Cherrydalers. In the 1920s and '30s it sheltered the kissing booth during the annual carnival put on by the Cherrydale Volunteer Fire Department. Everyone in the neighborhood was dismayed when the huge old tree fell during a bad storm. A seedling that came up near that fallen tree was given to Cherrydale Library around 1963.
