# County Staff Discuss Construction Plan for New Fire Station

Cherrydale Citizens Association and Arlington County staff held a special meeting on December 6<sup>th</sup> to provide an overview of the construction project for the new fire station. In attendance were Troy Harris (Real Estate Bureau of Arlington County), Kimberly Pruitt, Leo Dizon (Engineer, DES Engineering and Capital Projects Division), CCA officers, and about 20 Cherrydale residents.

The following are excerpts from the meeting minutes provided on Cherrydale's listserv by CCA Secretary Gloria Hurdle.

CCA President **Brian Bonnet** opened the meeting at 7:35 pm, explaining that County staff will present some of the aspects of the project, including easements, street closure, and traffic patterns during construction.

Kim Pruitt provided an overview. Overall, the multiphase project should take about 2½ years.

Construction will begin in late spring or early summer. 21<sup>st</sup> Road will be moved west and sit on the residential

property that County acquired through eminent domain. The two houses will be demolished. The site of the new fire station will be dug out, and then Koons will begin construction of its new three-story garage, using the fire station site for a staging area. Dirt from the excavation will be hauled away, and rodents will be exterminated. Cars from the dealership will be relocated, though a site has yet to be determined. Garage construction should take three to five months to complete. At the same time, construction of the new 21<sup>st</sup> Road will begin. This will include laying new curbs and sidewalks.

When the Koons garage and 21<sup>st</sup> Road are done, work on the new fire station will begin. One lane of 21<sup>st</sup> Road is to remain open at all times. Electric utility undergrounding will be done on Old Lee Hwy from the Five Points intersection to the entrance of the new fire station. When the new station is complete, fire trucks will exit onto Old Dominion, and the parking entrance will be on Old Dominion. Access to the station will be on 21<sup>st</sup> Road

and is a walk-in door, not a garage door. The new fire station will have three bays and hold six emergency vehicles.

Leo Dizon: There are 14 parking spaces on 21<sup>st</sup> Road right now, and when the project is done there'll be 16 spaces. Right now, Koons has 93 parking spaces, and they will have 113 spaces in the new garage. The 21<sup>st</sup> Road sidewalk will be 4½ feet wide. County will rebuild retaining walls for several homes, and add stairs.

Parking on 21<sup>st</sup> Road will be first come, first served. County has no control over who parks in public spaces, unless neighbors decide to adopt permit parking. Neighbors are warned that construction workers and Koons employees could vie for these spots.

The intersection of Stafford Street and 21<sup>st</sup> Road is considered dangerous, so County will build a larger radius curve and lower it by six inches. County will build wider driveway aprons to improve access for those residents. Overall, it should take about a year to build the new road, depending on how long it takes to do the undergrounding.

A resident asked about improved street lighting. Kim said there will be six Carlyle lights on the fire station property and along 21<sup>st</sup> Road near the new park.

Troy Harris handed out packets to all 21<sup>st</sup> Road residents present for the meeting. The packets included temporary construction easements for 12 houses and wall construction easements for five.

Temporary construction easements specify the easement area needed; identify the parts of lots work will be done on, and what that work is; and allow workers to trespass on property to construct curb, gutters, and sidewalk. Property will be restored by reseeding disturbed lawn areas, and County will replace nursery stock (one year guarantee). These agreements must be notarized. Construction issues may be addressed with the County Inspector (to be determined) or Troy Harris.

Wall construction easements state the square footage and location of the lot and the retaining wall to be built. Once built and accepted by County, maintenance of these walls transfer to the property owner. Owners must maintain the retaining walls in accordance with local, state and federal Code (this obligation is binding with the property's title). Same reseeding and replacement of nursery stock will be done.

Issues remain. Is the project under funded? What provisions will there be in the new fire station for the volunteer firemen? County hasn't received the land from Koons, though an agreement is underway. This is needed to keep the project on schedule. What about trees that County promised but aren't yet in the plans? The CCA will continue to work and negotiate with County for these and additional issues as they may arise.

# Ask Your Pharmacist ....





#### Christina, I've been told to increase my fiber intake. I've started to eat a bran muffin each morning. Is that enough? From, Bland Bran

Here's the scoop on fiber, Bland. A good diet contains about 25 to 30 grams of fiber a day. Bran muffins contain about five grams of fiber. While you're starting the day off with a nice serving of fiber, you still have a ways to go to get all the benefits of added fiber in your diet.

Foods high in fiber can help treat constipation, hemorrhoids, diverticulitis, and irritable bowel syndrome. Dietary fiber may help lower your cholesterol and may reduce your risk of heart disease, diabetes, and certain types of cancer.

There are two main types of fiber - insoluble and soluble. Soluble fiber forms a gel when mixed with liquid, while insoluble fiber doesn't. Insoluble fiber has a laxative effect. Whole-wheat flour, wheat bran, nuts, and many vegetables are good sources of insoluble fiber. Soluble fiber is thought to have beneficial effects on the body and may lower cholesterol and blood sugar levels. Soluble fiber can be found in oats, peas, beans, apples, citrus fruits, carrots, barley and psyllium.

It's best to eat a wide variety of high-fiber foods. If you eat a minimum of five servings of fruits and vegetables and six servings of grain products (at least three of which are whole grains), you'll be closer to meeting your daily fiber requirements. While the best sources of fiber are plant foods, fiber supplements like Metamucil, Citrucel, and FiberCon may be useful in helping you reach your daily goal.

A sudden increase in fiber in your diet may cause significant gas and abdominal discomfort. Increase fiber in your diet gradually over a period of a few weeks. You should drink more fluids like water when increasing your fiber intake, because fiber works best when it absorbs water.

Always ask your pharmacist or doctor about what changes in diet and what medicines, including vitamins and dietary supplements, if any, may be appropriate for.

Is Vitamin V in vour diet? lt's a new vitamin called Volunteerism. It's good for you!



## Be Part of the Cherrydale Listserv and Stay Informed!

The Cherrydale listserv began in August 2000 and, since then, has helped keep people informed about the Fire Station, parks clean up, caroling and other important community events and topics. It has provided information exchange between neighbors, reunited lost dogs with their owners, and provided recommendations regarding handymen and cleaning services. It helps people stay in touch with their community and what's going on. This is an important thing in today's busy and hectic world.

With 327 subscribers, the listserv is at an all-time high in membership! We add folks every week, and the more people that use the listserv to share information, the better. But, with over 1,300 households in Cherrydale, that means many still aren't a part of it! At the end of this article is information on how to subscribe. Please send it to your neighbors so that they know how to join.

The Basics. The moderators (Conrad Rehill, Bill Roman and Eric Dobson) and CCA President Brian Bonnet thought it would be a good idea to remind people of listserv etiquette and management items. There are few rules, and we intend to keep it that way. Self-regulation of the listserv has worked well, so there's no reason to make more rules. So, here we go:

- 1. **Membership** is intended for those who live and work in Cherrydale and/or adjacent neighborhoods. All new membership requests are screened to make sure this criteria is met. (Each year we screen out dozens of inappropriate email addresses belonging to spammers).
- 2. **Email attachments** are NOT allowed on the listserv and will be magically removed by YAHOO. We do this as they may contain viruses and jeopardize computers. All listserv members can post files to Cherrydale's section of www.egroups.yahoo.com, but you need a YAHOO account to do that.
- 3. You can post community events to a Cherrydale calendar at www.egroups.yahoo.com. This is a computer-generated calendar based on information put on it. Any listserv member with a YAHOO account can



post to the calen-dar. Be sure postings I appeal to the community at large. A cool feature - you can set reminders (like CCA meeting announcements).

4. **Replying to messages** - Our system encourages dialog. When you "reply" to a message, you may be

sending it to EVERYONE. If your message is only meant for the sender, please reply only to the sender.

- 5. Moderators may remove inappropriate material or refuse access to members who abuse our service. Everything you post is viewable by the public at large.
- 6. **Too much email?** You can change your preferences to receive a daily digest, or even turn it off and just read messages as they're archived on the site. Also, if you go away for a few days, turn off the email. Many people have auto replies and those tell the listserv that you're out of town. Again, go to www.egroups.yahoo.com and check your preferences. If you have problems changing your settings, let one of the moderators know.
- 7. **Don't be afraid** to try the listserv. If you make a mistake, don't worry everyone goofs. The moderators and even the listserv community coach folks who have questions about posting or reading emails.
- 8. What can you post? Our listserv, despite what it may seem, is NOT restricted to emails about development and fire stations. If you have a yard sale, need a nanny, have babysitting skills or handyman services you want to offer, that's all okay to post.
- 9. **Email archives** We've archived 4,400 emails posted to the listserv at www.egroups.yahoo.com. Wow! All were important to open discussion in our community.
- 10. **What are appropriate topics?** Good question. The general rule of thumb is: "Does this apply to the general community?" The listserv is for Cherrydale and Cherrydale stuff. Politics can be a touchy topic, so postings should be limited to general non-partisan topics.
- **To join,** send an email to <u>CherrydaleCitizens-subscribe@yahoogroups.com</u>. Include your name and address. Send the email from the address you want to send and receive messages from. Folks are "approved" for the listsery within a few days.

# Update on Crime in Cherrydale

On December 12<sup>th</sup>, detectives with Arlington County Police Department's Special Victims Unit released a computer sketch of a suspect in a series of suspicious incidents. On at least eight occasions since November 21, a man

carrying a laptop computer approached females on the street in North Arlington and showed them pornographic movies on the computer. County detectives have talked with Fairfax County police regarding similar incidents that have taken place in that county.

Several of the victims were high school students. As a precaution, parents are urged to remind their children to walk in pairs or groups, to and from school. They should walk in well-lit areas, if at all possible.

Anyone who is approached by this man should call 911 immediately.

The suspect is described as a Hispanic male, between 25 and 40 years old, 5'7" tall and about 170 lbs with a medium build. In some of the incidents, the suspect wore a gray-hooded sweatshirt and jeans.

#### A Friend in Need

About this time, I got a call from a friend in Cherrydale that one of my dearest friends, Dean, was hospitalized in Virginia with a serious illness. I needed to get there as soon as possible to see him. It was hard to abandon my clean up work, but I knew Dean needed me. I arrived in Virginia on October 21st. I had hoped to care for him at his home after he was discharged. But the gods weren't kind and Dean passed away a week after I arrived. I'm fortunate to have shared that time with him.



## Why Not Cherrydale?

My other Virginia friends urged me not to return to Louisiana. I had lost almost everything, "Why not start over in Dean's house?" they implored. It was an inviting offer. I mulled it over on my trip back to New Orleans. After much thought, I finally had to admit that I could no longer live in the Big Easy - a place I had come to call home. I was seething with anger over the way things were being handled, or mishandled, or not handled at all. Rent increases were astronomical because there were so few properties that were habitable. My landlord decided not to rent but sell what was left of the house, so I had no place to live. All I had was my truck, my dog and cat, and a bird I had rescued - along with a few personal belongings. Months after the storm had hit. there were still no schools, banks, gas stations, grocery stores, libraries, and only sporadic electricity. Sigh.

Between November and March, I drove back and forth between New Orleans and Cherrydale six times. By March, five months after Katrina, the Big Easy was still a big disaster area. I'd had enough. I decided to stay in Dean's house in Cherrydale. It was so strange being there without him. But he gave me a great gift - a wonderful place to stay in a warm neighborhood, complete with old friends I made from my days in the military.

#### **Epiloque**

I still love New Orleans, and I tried to do my best to help the city recover. I helped get two old men to safety. I tried to salvage the homes of my clients and provide some paid work for returning evacuees. But being there became more than I could bear. I'll return to help my daughter leave. She lasted longer than I did, but she's finally thrown in the towel, too. It's simply too hard to live

I talk to friends almost every day. They echo my frustration and want to leave, but they have nowhere to go. And sometimes, no matter how bad things are, the familiar is just better - or, at least, easier - than the unknown. Thanks, Cherrydale, for welcoming me. I now have a new place to call home, and it feels so good. So very good.

Welcome home, Linda. It's good to have you.

Remember that, even now, folks still struggle to live in New Orleans. This story is one of continued despair, and yet one of hope. Find both, and count the blessings you truly have. This is Linda's story, in her own words. - The Editor

#### Send in the Ex-Marine (cont'd)

About 10 p.m. one night, I learned that my friend Ralph was sitting on his front porch, shotgun in hand, vowing never to be taken alive. I got in my car to drive into New Orleans to rescue Ralph. My friend was a humanitarian who worked with "Doctors without Borders" and was supposed to have left that weekend to take medical supplies to a children's hospital in Cuba. That was why he had refused to evacuate.

I got to the city around 2 a.m. but National Guard troops stopped me and told me to turn around. I was taught in the military never to accept "no" from anyone without the authority to order "yes," so I demanded to see the officer in charge, a young lieutenant. He told me there was nothing he could do to help. I then asked him why he had been deployed to New Orleans. He replied, "to help you". I insisted that now would be an ideal time to do just that. Afterall, the Guardsmen were only sitting around playing cards. I convinced the lieutenant to help me rescue Ralph. We sat down with a map, and I showed him where Ralph's home was. I told the lieutenant that Ralph was hard of hearing and armed to the teeth. The poor guy gave me a look, picked up a bullhorn, and told his troops to put on their bulletproof vests.

I couldn't go with them, so I gave the lieutenant a note for Ralph along with my driver's license so Ralph would know that I was behind the rescue. Twenty Guardsmen departed in six vehicles to rescue my friend. Two hours later, the troops returned - with Ralph and an older man

that Ralph had rescued from the storm! There was laughter, hugging and photo ops. Everyone rejoiced in being part of something positive! The older man had been washed out of his home in Chalmette when it was completely submerged by flood water. He was left with only the clothes on his back - even his shoes had been washed away by Katrina! After talking with him, we learned that he had family in Florida. I began the task of contacting them and arranging their reunion.

Ralph had to hook up with his "Doctors without Borders" compatriots, and the man he rescued had to get to his family in Florida. I ended up taking them both to a Louisiana town near the Texas border. The town had a small, functioning airport. Through ways I won't mention, I managed to get to Ralph's house and we found his passport. Everything was in order. I got both men on appropriate flights and their new journeys in life began.

## We Try to Clean Up

Since I was so close to Texas. I decided seek help from FEMA. They were nowhere to be found in New Orleans, and Texas had just been hit by Rita, so I thought I'd give it a try. I crossed the border and found an office where I could register with FEMA. A week later, I drove my 50 miles from home to buy gasoline and pick up a phone signal to make necessary calls. I found an ATM and discovered that FEMA had deposited \$2,000 in my bank account. It was time, I thought, to start my cleanup.

I tried to prevail, working daily from dawn to dusk trying to salvage what I could of my clients' homes. I hired local people as they returned to town and paid them with my FEMA money. I ripped out sheetrock. I owned a 20" chainsaw and even hired two loggers from Oregon to cut trees off people's houses. Without success, I tried to find out how to access the federal money that was supposed to be pouring into the city so I could continue to save my clients' homes from further ruin. The more I did, the more there was to do, and the less money there was to do it with. The frustration was palpable.





# Cherrydale Recipes from the kitchen of Katherine Christensen

### Preheat oven to 250 degrees.

- 1 package white raisins
- 1 C orange juice
- 3 C sifted flour
- 1 quart pecans (1 lb)
- 1 box coconut
- 1 package candied cherries (16 oz)

Ingredients

- 1 small bottle green cherries
- 1 small bottle red cherries
- 2 C sugar
- 1/2 C butter
- 6 eggs

Grease 4 small bread pans and line with wax paper.

Combine white raisins and orange juice.

Combine sifted flour, pecans, coconut, candied cherries, green cherries, and red

In separate bowl, stir sugar and butter together until creamy. Add eggs, one at a time, beating mixture after each egg has been added.

Add all combined mixtures into sugar/butter/egg mixture, using juice (approximately ½ C) from the cherries.

Pour into greased pans. Bake for three hours.

Place pans of water in oven along with fruit cake for steaming.

Makes 4 small loaves. Enjoy!
