# Meeting with County Manager Regarding Lee Highway Undergrounding Delays

CCA president Maureen Ross will be meeting with County Manager Barbara Donnellen January 12th to discuss (and strongly object) to delays in not only the undergrounding along Lee Highway but to all county related projects in Cherrydale. Maureen believes delays are due to a disorganized mismanagement of projects. Perhaps this comes from County Board members changing priorities back and forth among numerous County-wide projects, and starting projects they can't finish, on top of Department of Engineering lack of focus and discipline, along with Virginia Dept. of Transportation bureaucracy issues. Either way, Arlington has a new and welcome County Manager in Ms. Donellen, and the opportunity presents for significant improvement in project management.

At this point, we don't care what the reasons are. We do know long delays are a habit in Arlington County outside of the Metro corridor. Seven blocks of Lee Highway have been a construction project on and off again for 11 years (and it was planned in 1994)! The endless starts and stops, construction mess and interactions with near neighbors have adversely affected businesses, and caused our main thoroughfare to look run-down. (see page 2)

# County Snow Blower Loan.... We Need a Few More Volunteers

The County established a community snowblower loan several years ago but never had enough. This year Maureen Ross applied for a loan for Cherrydale. Jim Todd has volunteered to store the blower and to use it for our purposes. We do need more volunteers though and volunteers must be trained. The more volunteers the more we can accomplish. Note, this is NOT an excuse not to clear your own sidewalks. But we will try to help the elderly and areas that have not been cleared in past.

In order to qualify for a County snowblower loan, Cherrydale had to come up with a policy/set of priorities which are the following:

According to Wikipedia, "The **broken windows theory** is a criminolgical theory of the normsetting and signalling effects. The theory states that **monitoring and maintaining** urban environments in a well-ordered condition may prevent further vandalism as well as an escalation into more serious crime." In Maureen's experience, there seems to have been more documented crime and especially vandalism here in Cherrydale in the past 5 years than experienced in the previous 10 years. If the police argue that point she is happy to take out her list and compare it to the police reports.

The CCA maintains that allowing tall weeds, construction debris, broken signs and yes, broken windows, to remain for months and years along Lee Hwy sends a signal that the area is not monitored or cared for and actually encourages further careless behavior. It even affects the attitude of county engineers. When the CCA objected to a phone pole being placed in the middle of the Lincoln St sidewalk blocking stroller and wheelchair access, one engineer responded by saying, "It's a sidewalk going nowhere for God's sake", as if the whole block was a wasteland. Well, it was a sidewalk that had a broken window at old Cherrydale Motors, weeds growing up the pole site 3 feet, and a hundred pound cable left leaning on another pole. Years of construction mess left the engineers to feel free to disregard the land and hence us, the people who live here.

Since 2004 the CCA has met on-site with County Board Members Paul Ferguson, Jay Fissette, Walter Tejada and Barbara Favola to show them our objections to the delays, the mess, the lack of cooperation from engineers, and lack of communication. We've had the board members visit Bono Films site, Lincoln St, and N Pollard St where a phone pole narrows the entrance from Lee Hwy. None of these meetings has brought about change.

County has promised completion of the undergrounding repeatedly since 2002. In November 2004 County Engineer Robert Froh informed us, "the undergrounding of overhead utilities on the south side of Lee Hwy from Oakland to I-66 is in progress" and estimated completion in 6 months! In March of 2006 engineers refused to move the site for utility boxes at Bono films stating the undergrounding would be finished shortly. On January 15, 2008 we met again to discuss the undergrounding delays and objections over Bono Films mess and N Lincoln St. In May of same year we took county engineers on a tour of Lee Hwy undergrounding related eye-sores. The next year, August 10 2010, County Engineer Luis Aroya wrote, "...DES is currently working on finalizing the design plans for undergrounding the utilities along Lee Highway. Dominion Virginia Power and Verizon are actively working with the County to resolve the final design issues that should enable the project to move forward sometime in the spring of 2010." He then wrote, "You also wanted to know if the apron on Lee Highway and North Pollard Street could be pushed back to alleviate the present narrow street intersection. Unfortunately, the only way to widen the intersection as you suggest would require the removal of the two utility poles that cannot be removed until the overhead lines are relocated underground as mentioned above. Also, the area directly behind the recently-repaired corner will be used for construction vehicle access by the Ed Peete Company throughout the period needed to make the building repairs." So the County clearly knows about all these problems and yet we learn in September 2010 that they still haven't figured out how to finalize the undergrounding. (see page 5, column 1)

Lee Hwy bus stops and route to Safeway to be cleared in 24 hours Route to Schools via N Monroe St and N Randolph St to be cleared in 24 hours including I 66 over pass

- 1) Lee Hwy clearance between I 66 ON ramp all the way up to Quincy St will be our first priority. We have sent letters to every business on that street on the CHERRYDALE side and asked them to step up and keep their sidewalks clear. We would have one of our volunteers clear the parts that are not cleared by businesses. Certain sections are never shoveled the corner on Lee and N Monroe (Dominion Powers corner up to just before AHC) for example, and sections with absentee landowners though RED TOP cab has PROMISED to clear their sections. Most parts near car and gas stations are never shoveled but we raised a little hell and expect some improvement this year.
- 2) Walks to schools would be next priority, N Monroe St to Science Focus including overpass, and Randolph St from Old Lee Hwy to St Agnes and then hopefully down to overpass.

If we get that much done we will have cleared main access for most commuters to buses, metro, and kids going to 2 elementary schools and the high school. Understand, individual property owners are still obliged to clear their sections of sidewalk!

These 2 goals encompass such a large area that ideally we should have 2 snowblowers, one for the west side from Quincy west to Utah, and other for east side. I understand at last County Board meeting that 2 communities took 2-4 snowblowers each so there were none left over. We don't want to be selfish. But we'd gladly take 2 snowblowers if available but have been offered just one thus far.

Jim Todd has volunteered stating he'd be able to store the snowblower and use it for above purposes. Maureen Ross will also take the training. We need and will ask for more volunteers in case one or both of us are away, sick or tired. Training will be held Wednesday the 12<sup>th</sup> of January at 6:00 pm, Saturday the 15<sup>th</sup> of January 8am and Monday the 17<sup>th</sup> of January 9am. Training will be held at 2700 South Taylor St. Arlington Va. 22206. Please respond to which training works best for your schedule. # Neighborhood Conservation Micro Project Ideas to be Funded

Cherrydale is ready for your Neighborhood Conservation Micro Project Ideas. Each NC affiliated neighborhood may choose one NC type project every two years. Unlike conventional NC projects, however, no "points" are needed to obtain funding. The only requirement is that the civic association votes and approves the project. That will make this classification of project much quicker to scope and build than a traditional NC project.

There is a catch — the project must cost under \$10,000, including all labor and materials. The point of this new program is to fund projects that are too big for something like Missing Links, which only covers sidewalk to up to three homes, and doesn't allow for easements, telephone pole relocation, or tree removal, and also too small for an NC project which typically costs \$400K-\$750K.

Micro projects are not limited to sidewalk though. Your ideas are only limited by your imagination as long as they fit into what is a traditional NC type capital project. That could be anything from a park renovation to a neighborhood gateway to a sidewalk extension. The only NC type project that definitely would not qualify is street lights as installation costs over \$10K.

# Cherrydale Citizens Association Annual Financial Report

In 2010, we had 95 dues paying members. Let's increase that number for 2011! We have 532 listserve members as of August 2010.

Income was \$3457.40, with about 80% from ads for Sweet and Sour News. Other sources of income were memberships, donations, and sales of logo merchandise such as Tee shirts. Collections for ads for the 2011 newsletter are not included.

Spending was \$4516.86. The largest expense was \$3346.36 for printing, followed by 462.75 for logo merchandise, and \$450 for the 4<sup>th</sup> of July party. The remaining \$257.78 was for supplies, the parade, the yard sale, a park cleanup project, and Civic Federation dues.

Balance on January 1, 2011, was \$11,739

CCA President **Maureen Ross** notes that active involvement with the CCA is much higher than represented by dues revenues (eg. see listserve membership). We only remind people to pay dues just prior to the annual officer elections and probably need to go back to routinely collecting at our events including meetings. Most people just forget if they've paid or not. It's just 5\$ for a family to join, a rate that has not changed in over 10 years.

In November 2009 Luis Araya was invited to a CCA meeting to discuss the litigation over undergrounding. He declined. The lawyer for County (MacIssac) was invited but also declined. He does say that County has Peete's \$250,000 for the undergrounding. So there will be no problems or delays getting the undergrounding. Finally in the July of 2010, Maureen Ross called engineer Mike Collins for update on undergrounding. He responded that engineers are having to search for the files. In August Maureen called Mike Collins again, and was told it will take another 2 years.

Apparently there has been ZERO action taken on this project in over 4 years other than to fight CCA about the utility box at I-66 on-ramp by Bono Films, and the new phone pole placed in blocking sidewalk on N Lincoln St. The width of N Pollard St., as part of the Bromptons site plan, was connected to 20<sup>th</sup>, and widened. Complaints at CCA meetings were voiced about the difficulties with travel on N. Pollard and Lee.

In July of 2008 there was a flurry of emails to county engineers about the sudden appearance of the wheelchair ramp on N Pollard St. This newly "improved" street was supposed to be 28 ft wide and was in fact now only 19 ft wide due to the new ramp and old phone pole. Emails show that County engineers couldn't figure out who put the ramp in.

Maureen Ross then tracked down VDOT Jose Penata about the new ramp and he replied that a "VDOT contractor put it in and that County simply needs to inform him they don't want it and it will be removed." Maureen informed the county including the assistant county manager about this fact, but County took no further action taken. At the September 2010 CCA meeting Barbara Avila promised (with engineers Mike Collins, Robert Froth, Luis Aroma and Abe Abolished present) that the engineers would immediately apply for the permit to remove at least the handicap ramp (or move it back). Engineers stated clearly that the ramp could be removed in just 2 months. Ms Favola and engineers promised to come up with a reasonable proposal for time-line for the final undergrounding, knowing that we were rejecting the estimated 2 years. They also agreed that VDOT, Dominion Power and the engineers would meet with CCA officers in October.

Instead, County engineers disinvited the VDOT people, the very persons who County was blaming for part of the long delays. CCA officers met with just County and Dominion Powers, turned down the now 2 to 3 year estimated delay and insisted on more reasonable timelines. We did promise to vet the option that would help move this process along, and provide a sidewalk for Quebec St from 21<sup>st</sup> to Old Lee Hwy. This option was reviewed in the November newsletter and presented to members at the CCA meeting, which then approved the measure. County will take the underground utilities south down Quincy, then turn right on 21st, and right again on Quebec for final undergrounding. Reasons for choosing this option was to preserve parking for the church on the corner, which has little parking space.

County insisted on widening the sidewalk which would mean loss of all on-street parking on one side. We rejected that option. Another option was to get an exception to widening the sidewalk rule, but they still needed room for a straight row of phone poles, which for engineering/structural purposes need to be somewhat in the street.

This could be dealt with by inserting phone pole "curbs" which allows a few spaces for parking. This is a little used street except on Sundays for services, but if there is reduced parking, the churchgoers will have to use the residential blocks. The CCA voted for this option, which preserves most of the parking, and gains the residents a new improved sidewalk. While the CCA showed great flexibility and adaption to a new option, the County did not. Despite promises to remove the ramp in 2 months, the County had only just begun the application process for removing the VDOT installed wheelchair ramp in mid November. So already they are more than 2 months behind because they haven't even completed the paperwork.

So this is the way it goes and is why we are meeting with the new county manager. There are many ways to improve this system. But the first thing is to do what they say they will do, and keep a strong line of communication open to the neighborhood associations. Cherrydale has shown the will, the interest, motivation and WORK ETHIC to finish projects. And we do it all as volunteers after our full time jobs and other obligations. We expect the same from County.
