• You gather your "treasures", "junk", collectibles, antiques, sporting goods, toys, books, furniture, clothes, or "whatevers",

• You call or email Scott Springston or Kathy Holt (703-528-1548, sdakss@aol.com) and they will put you on the map for a mere \$5 donation – which barely covers the cost of the ads, the flyers, maps, signs and arrows! This year, due to many non paying customers, you must pay before you are listed on the map!! The deadline to be included in the sale is June 10th.

• The evening before or the morning of the sale, you put the items out in front if your house, decide on the price you want, and wait for the hordes of buyers to come pouring in – that's all there is to it!!

• Kids, can set up a lemonade stand and sell lemonade and other goodies! No fee for children-run sales!

Scott and Kathy will handle the advertising – including making a map (listing all the houses holding a sale) which is distributed to the people holding sales (so they in turn can pass them out to customers); the maps are also posted in various spots in the community; ads are taken out in several local newspapers, and the sale is listed online also. Churches of Cherrydale (Pt 6): Cherrydale United Methodist Church

Dr. Elizabeth Foss, now in her 3rd year as pastor of Cherrydale United Methodist Church, speaks with pride of her church's involvement in service projects. "Last year, working with SOLE HOPE, we made shoes for Ugandan children who had been laid low by jiggers infecting their bare feet, and closer to home, we packaged 30,000 relief meals for Stop Hunger Now."

The many missions give opportunities for service to congregants of all ages from the youngest--toddlers packing relief meals for AFAC---to the oldest---Mildred at 104, still working the Vegetable Drop from the mid-Atlantic Gleaning Network. "Every one of the 200 or so regular worshippers volunteers for something," Foss said. The church also donated \$80,000 last year to a variety of natural disaster relief



drives. "We're demonstrating to our kids how they can make a difference in people's lives."

In speaking of Methodism, Foss explained that what distinguishes their theology is the founder's focus on grace. John Wesley believed we were all born in grace. His goal was to bring Sunday beliefs into practice during the week.

The church has long been a center for Boy Scout, Girl Scout, and Cub Scout activities in North Arlington. A large display case in the basement, packed with vintage Scout memorabilia, attests to continued commitment. In fact, CUMC's Boy Scout Troop, founded in 1917, is one of the oldest in the country.

The building at Lorcom & Nelly Custis has an inviting, airy sanctuary with traditional wood pews and high arched windows for the 11 a.m. service, but Teri and I attended the 8:30, held in a smaller, more intimate chapel off the narthex. It felt familial, particularly when Rev. Foss spoke of the special "care package" mailing to the church's several members serving in Afghanistan.

As with several other Cherrydale churches, many of the 450 members come from outside the neighborhood, having been raised here, then moving away, but returning for the feeling of community.

Open to all is an Alcoholics Anonymous meeting on Tuesdays at 8 p.m., an annual Easter egg hunt, a living nativity at Christmas, and periodic Christian Ethics seminars using TV shows such as Northern Exposure and The Vicar of Dibley for discussion points.

Gardening with Friends

Let's say you're a typical American family---an Egyptian father, a Japanese mother, and your 2-year-old daughter who greatly exceeds her CQ (Cuteness Quotient). You're looking for something all of you can do together on a Saturday morning. The answer: you decide to share your passion, experience, and skill by offering a gardening class to the neighbors of your Cherrydale church at no cost. How cool is that?!

At the Cherrydale Bible Church at 20th & Monroe, Wilson and Yuko walked us through the process of planning a garden, fertilizing, sprouting seeds, and planting. We also learned that placing different plants near each other can produce mutual growing benefit; e.g., tomatoes and basil seem to ward off each other's pests.

My favorite was to plant beans next to corn. The bean vines climb the corn stalks and the corn doesn't mind. Then they took us outside for some hands-on practice in replanting seedlings and on working the soil, both the potting kind and the more nutrient-filled top soil. We cheerfully played with dirt for an hour. Wilson had asked us to bring pots, which we filled with his soil and with seedlings that they had generously sprouted for us. Everyone went home with an herb or two and a veggie starter plant.

The event drew neighbors with a range of gardening experience, most of us just wanting to produce some home-grown staples like tomatoes, cucumbers, zucchini and the like and an assortment of back-deck herbs. What a pleasant way to spend a Saturday morning with neighbors and friends! Thank you, Wilson. And, as Oliver said, more please.

Gardener's Corner: What to Plant Now


Spring suddenly came upon us this year as a welcome surprise after the late snow and rain. If you're interested in planting now, there are many wonderful things you can try, either in pots or in the ground. Most of these will need some direct sun, about 6-8 hours per day. All will need good soil. If you're planting in the ground near a foundation wall which usually contains concrete chunks and construction debris, you must remove the bad soil and replace it with a mixture of top soil, manure, sand, finely ground mulch and a little peat moss; also, try to keep in some native clay because it contains good nutrients. (Merrifield sells a product called Virginia Super Fines that is good for soil amending). A good handful of soil should compact nicely when you close your hand around it, and yet crumble evenly when you press on it. The same goes for potting soil, though it's so easy to buy pre-mixed potting soil in perfect proportions, you can save some time and use that. If you want a soil preparation demo, you can go to You Tube and type in, "how to make good garden soil," and you'll get plenty of ideas. If you plant in pots, keep in mind you will need to water much more often than if you plant in the ground. If you're planning on going away for vacation, a great way to keep your plants watered is to hire the neighborhood kids!

<u>Herbs</u>: parsley, sage, rosemary, thyme, chives, tarragon, cilantro, dill, oregano, basil, lavender, lemon verbena, mint (plant mint only in pots, as it spreads too much in the ground and will take over)

<u>Vegetables</u>: lettuce, spinach, swisschard, radishes, carrots, tomatoes, beets, string beans, onions, shallots, broccoli, brussels sprouts, potatoes (you should You Tube growing potatoes); zucchini, yellow squash, cucumbers (these take up quite a bit of space); and, some things you can try now, though they prefer cooler weather: peas, kale, mustard greens, collards, kohlrabi, cabbage; and, some larger items you can plant but need to be aware that they will take up large portions of the yard: pumpkins and watermelons.

<u>Flowers</u>: Great potted plants for our area are geraniums and petunias, because they bloom all summer and they withstand the heat and humidity beautifully (as long as you keep them watered); but try anything that strikes your fancy, because there is so much out there to try and enjoy!



Let us lift our trowels now and proclaim loudly that Spring is coming. Gardens left idle for months are beginning to claim our interest. Seed catalogues cover our desks. Visions of plump, red tomatoes fill our daydreams. I wonder too if my assistant will return. Free labor is so unpredictable.

We were like two enemies circling to measure each other's worth. The robin hopped onto the rim of the planter. He glanced down and then looked up at me. When he judged that I



When I returned to finish the garden, the robin returned to help. On this second day, the cutworm harvest was not as abundant as yesterday's. The robin was displeased. Where were the worms of yesterday? When he looked at me, I could tell he wanted me to work harder. He was trying to reverse our roles and be the boss. When I quit for the day, he stayed behind to inspect my work.

For weeks afterwards, whenever I approached the garden, the robin would return to his post. Eventually, he understood that the cutworm harvest was over and he moved on.

WalkArlington

The WalkArlington program is a series of neighborhood walking tours created in recognition of Arlington's designation as a Gold-Level Walk Friendly Community. A tour route through Cherrydale has been identified as a means of encouraging walking in combination with learning more about the unique residential, historic, commercial and institutional resources that comprise our community. After receiving from residents of Cherrydale numerous suggested resources for inclusion on the route, the WalkArlington staff has identified a 2.2-mile route through Cherrydale. This route highlights 12 locations illustrating the essence of our community.

The 12 locations, in the order that the route will follow, are:


- 1. HB Woodlawn School
- 2. La Union Grocery Store

- 3. The Washington Monument View from 21st St.
- 4. St. Agnes Church and School
- 5. Oakgrove Park
- 6. Cherrydale Valley Nature Area (Hidden Pond)
- 7. Historic Cherrydale Residential Area (Nelson and Monroe Streets)
- 8. Cherrydale- Maywood Mural
- 9. Cherrydale Hardware/Masonic Lodge
- 10. Cherrydale Historic Firehouse
- 11. Downtown Cherrydale Commercial Area
- 12. Cherrydale Library

Meetings with County by Maureen Ross

On behalf of Cherrydale I met several times this past winter/early spring with assistant county managers Shannon Flanagan-Watson and Wilfredo Calderon, as well as DES' Bo Bloomer to solve a few problems along Lee Hwy. Here in order are the items discussed and the results:

- Chronic mud puddle at bus stop by VDOT wall near Reinhardt's On any given day there is a 15-25 foot long stretch of mud and debris caught in the dank stew forcing pedestrians to either walk onto Lee Hwy, or get filthy shoes. We have been photographing and reporting this problem to both VDOT and Arlington County for over 3 years (a dozen times) see a few here: http://www.cherrydale.net/may-2013--- follow-up-on-lee-highway-punch-list.html. Prior to our complaints, a Maywood resident who takes that bus had reported the problem twice and never heard a response. As of April 21, Mr. Calderon had the impression, yet to be confirmed, that VDOT had agreed to fix the leak in the concrete wall causing the problem. However my last conversation from VDOT was that County wasn't managing the water flow from its property behind the wall. In an update 4/29, we had no promises. So I sent a formal complaint to the Walk Arlington and Pedestrian Advisory Committee. It can't hurt. Thus far, no improvements.
- Stairway up to Maywood by Reinhardts Volunteers cleaned up the entrance last spring and hauled away 4 bags of soil resulting from plant debris decaying over decades, blocking the landing of the stairs. Another pile of debris and soil is back blocking the entrance as we speak. This is the result of failure to provide even the most basic maintenance and is emblematic of County's maintenance of Lee Hwy Cherrydale. These wonderful stairs have a landing mid way up that could become an attractive entrance to Maywood. At this moment I am working on finding volunteers to a garden there. In the meantime, have County remove the debris at the landing, where since there is never maintenance there should be no garden. Thus far no improvements but I am now counting more on volunteers than the county.
- Car World cars block sidewalk This was actually reported separately and as of a few weeks ago County's Dave Goodman did get the cars moved back. If you see car fenders hanging over onto sidewalk, please let me know.
- Illegal signage violation We all have noted the 5-8 sidewalk signs put out every weekend by Mattress Warehouse. Only 1 is allowed. The same company on the corner of Wilson Blvd and Oakland also posts 5-8 signs on weekends. Both sites have been reported regularly to Code Enforcement. Last year staff admitted they were just throwing the reports away as despite the photos, the violations were on weekends and not witnessed by staff. This was infuriating, so it went up the chain. Now, Code is responding that County has no enforcement of it's signage rules on Lee Hwy as it is a VDOT road. Well that comes as news to Deborah Albert, staff expert on sign regulations, who toured Lee Hwy a few years ago with us the explain the exact rules. The assistant county managers are "looking into" this situation (it's been several months...). No action as yet.
- **Capitol Bikeshare** there was a delay in getting Safeway lawyers to sign the agreement and then a delay getting County to approve the installation. I asked for help with moving the approval process. As of 4/29 it's still not approved, stuck somewhere between the 2 groups of lawyers.

- Pedestrian and handicap crossing from Cherrydale Rehab to Safeway The cut in the island to allow wheelchair movement is too narrow and often has debris. In addition, the access point is not where most people cross. You can see the wear in the median where people prefer to cross - directly from the nursing home's pavement to Safeway building, just west of the driveway. Pedestrians interviewed say it's more direct, and it's after the busy driveway, so they feel safer. (see a video here: http:// www.cherrydale.net/safer-crosswalks-for-lee-hwy-and-cherrydale.html)This is apparently one of the reasons wheelchair bound people tend to cross up by Oakland to Safeway's west end if they want to visit 7/11. It is where one resident was struck several years ago (at night, in the rain, when half a dozen street lights were out). Apparently the structure of sidewalks, incline, and traffic pattern make this a preferred crossing. Whether or not County approves it, by law every intersection is a legal crossing according to VDOT. Since this seems to be a preferred crossing perhaps county should make it so. To gather more information on pedestrian patterns, I suggested a camera be set up for 1-2 weeks. If county cannot supply staff to then count where people cross I am sure Cherrydale could provide volunteers to document what is witnessed on camera. This would inform us as to the best solution. County has taken no action but I sent the recommendation again to the new traffic czar Larry Marcus and we will meet the first week of May.
- CVFD's new pedestrian cross walk light at Pollard St This was installed blocking the sidewalk. We
 did get it moved back about 18 inches. Still, it forces people to walk closer to the edge of the corner.
 The installation is an example of not working with the community. Apparently planned for years, creative
 alternatives became impossible at the last minute. I mention this because as evidenced in the decades
 long undergrounding project, all the big mistakes were due to so-called small details not vetted with the
 community in the planning stages, where easiest solutions can be found.
- Construction supervision Cherrydale has enough volunteers to help County monitor public utility construction sites. At the end of the day, sites should be inspected. If a tree is damaged or debris left behind, it must be reported and redressed immediately. At the completion of a project the county engineer and a CCA volunteer should walk the site to look for problems and assure that all is as it should be. (Note Cherrydale conducted walk thrus of Lee Hwy several times to get details correct but this was sometimes months or even years after the work was done. You can read about that here: http://www.cherrydale.net/lee-highway-improvementsutility-undergrounding.html)
- 5-Point intersection We have a new traffic czar, Larry Marcus. I met him at a Lee Hwy Presidents planning session several months ago. I was alarmed that in his presentation he mentioned plans for 5-points but had in fact NEVER HEARD of our committee or Cherrydale's views. How can that be? In fact, it turns out County staff thought we faked the video volunteers took of the 1.5 block back up on Quincy to south of 20th Street. During one single red light we filmed 5 cars from the back up turn right onto 20th and left onto Pollard then right onto Lee. This cut thru traffic is the result of the addition of the left turn only lane, which is about 100 yards too long and usually almost empty, forcing all the other cars into a single lane. Larry and I plan to meet first week in May and I will invite members of the 5 points committee to attend. - Fire Station number 3 Here is an excellent site for a cross walk, at the red light county added for the station. It would provide a wonderful short cut to the library (discovered by Tom Korns). Head east on old Lee, turn left onto 21st Rd and walk down the stairs by the fire station, from there cross Dominion/ Lee hwy and 30 feet to the right is a gate between the 2 sets of town homes. Though there is a gate it is a public easement with steps between the town homes to Military and the library. If County wants to really make Arlington a walking community, it needs to make these sorts of routes easy. County has turned this option down so far.
- **Finally, the state of our sidewalk trees** The grand willow oaks providing shade and thriving on Lee Hwy/Washington Blvd by the State Theatre (Falls Church) were planted the same time ours were, originally. Only ours have had to be replanted 3 times over and County can't manage to water them enough to keep them alive. The planting and maintaining of trees needs closer review.
